# Art tribute to war heroes

## Exhibition of paintings commemorates pair of anniversaries

The human faces of war are the focus of a new attraction commemorating two significant anniversaries.

The Studio One Artists launched their annual exhibition on Monday, with this year's effort marking the centenary of the First World War breaking out and 71 years since the Normandy landings of the Second World War.

Paintings of three real-life veterans and depictions about their lives form the centrepiece of the display.

**Prominent**  
Group member Pauline Fynn, 68, said: "I thought about marking the anniversaries as they are this year and a Normanly veteran, Dan Turner, is also one of our artists. That is how it came about."

The most prominent pieces are of 86-year-old Dan and the late veterans Fred Plumm and Sidney Billington.

Sidney, Pauline's father, was born 10 weeks before the First World War began.

His Aunt Catherine was just 16 when she was killed in the Silvertown explosion of 1917, when a fire in munitions factory set off a blast that killed 73 people. Sidney served in the Home Guard at the beginning of the Second World War and later went to Italy with the 6th Army. He died in 2006.

Pauline said: "He always said he had an easy war. "Going through his life was very emotional."

The exhibition, also featuring work outside the frames, runs until October 10 at the Cole Gallery, Queen's Theatre, Harwich.
